

Peggy Gossett-Seidman: Dedicated to Serving Florida's District 91

Peggy Gossett-Seidman has proudly called Highland Beach, Florida, home for over 30 years. Together with her husband, Dr. Barry Seidman, she raised three children, Tyler, Dallas, and Austin, while enjoying the natural beauty of South Florida's waterways through boating and diving.

Motivated by concerns in her local community, Peggy ran for the Highland Beach Town Commission, where she served for five years. Under her leadership, Highland Beach became the safest municipality in Florida, according to state crime data and multiple media reports.

In 2022, Peggy brought her passion for public service to the Florida State Legislature. In just two legislative sessions, she has secured over \$42 million in state funding — more than any other representative in Boca Raton's 100-year history. This includes a record-breaking \$19.28 million obtained in the most recent session alone. These funds have supported critical investments in water infrastructure, conservation, education, public safety, and nonprofit initiatives throughout Palm Beach County and across Florida.

Working across the aisle, she successfully passed eight impactful bills, including:

- **The Jeffrey Epstein Grand Jury Case Files Release**
- **Motor Voter Integrity Bill**
- **Safe Waterways/Public Bathing Places Bill**

Peggy is known for her integrity and practical approach to leadership, often stating, *"It's not hard to do the right thing."* She currently serves as Vice Chair of the PreK-12 Appropriations Subcommittee and is an active member of five additional committees, including the Water Quality, Supply, and Treatment Subcommittee.

Born on a U.S. Air Force base and raised in Michigan as the eldest of four children, Peggy attended Michigan State University, where she graduated with honors with a Bachelor of Arts degree in writing, journalism, and history. While there, she launched a trailblazing journalism career at the *State News* before becoming the first female sportswriter in the Big Ten and at The Palm Beach Post, where she covered tennis, auto racing, football, and baseball.

Peggy's career continued in journalism and media, working as a writer and media director for major organizations and events such as Wimbledon, the U.S. Open, the Women's Pro Tennis Tour (in 18 countries), the Burt Reynolds Jupiter Theater and TV Series, the Chris Evert Pro-Celebrity Classic, and many local schools and charities.

Peggy's lifelong dedication to families, education, and conservatism extends beyond her district, with involvement in organizations such as Points of Light, Florida's Ounce of Prevention Fund, Special Olympics, Best Buddies, and March of Dimes. She has published over 3,000 articles and earned 22 national and state awards for journalism and public service.

Through her leadership, District 91 has made historic progress — but Peggy believes there is more to be done. She remains committed to delivering common-sense, results-driven solutions for her constituents and for all Floridians.
